## 1. APOLOGIES

## 2. CONFLICTS OF INTEREST

Nil.

Mayor Gordon provided an overview of how the meeting may run with reports being considered first and then submissions. He acknowledged the work of staff to ensure that sound budget information is presented for consideration and commented on the challenges of the economic climate as the Council work through deliberations.

## 3. PRESENTATIONS

An overview was provided by G Bell (Acting General Manager Finance and Business Support).

G Bell presented a summary of the financial context. When the draft LTP documents went to the public for consultation, it was a prudent, and balanced plan for the community needs, with good headroom, necessary but not excessive rate increases whilst allowing for new initiatives and service levels. Since the draft was published new information has come to hand, with community views and submissions, along with staff reviewing some aspects of the budgets for changes. The financial information before the Council for consideration today takes into account the staff adjustments.

G Bell spoke to the summary of changes with both revenue and expenses higher. It should be noted that not all changes have rates impacts.

G Bell advised the rates impact, at the time of the draft LTP was 8.94% and now it is proposed an average rate of 9.39%.

Expense changes have reduced with some savings found. There are also revenue changes along with operational expenditure carry-overs having an impact, along with housing for the elderly being the main capital changes and some are timing changes that have been captured in the staff reports.

G Bell spoke to a presentation slide showing the rates impact over ten years. While there is a spike in the 2024/25 year he reminded the Council that they are only setting the rates for one year however the strategy is for 10 years. He spoke of how the budgets flows through to the second year of the LTP and then balance out.

G Bell mentioned options for reducing rates such as land sales, borrowing (short term solution), savings/change of level of service. He emphasised that we are operating in an uncertain environment with government reforms, interest rates, depreciation, inflation and reduced roading subsidies. There was a strong likelihood of being in this environment for the next couple of years yet and decisions today had to keep matters in context.

Mayor Gordon wondered if one of the drivers was insurance. G Bell advised that uncontrollable costs such as insurance was driving upwards and that was due to a number of factors. Two broad factors were the value of assets increasing, (as does the cover) and the level of natural disasters locally and worldwide which flow through globally and locally. Aspects of professional indemnity were affecting Council's' and 2023 Supreme Court decisions were making insurers wary of risk which in turn all has serious impacts on the costs. Currently staff are working closely with the insurers for the renewal process.

J Millward reminded the Council that rates had started at in excess of 19% when the budget process started and the prolonging of inflation has continued to impact. The Council either pass on costs or reduce the level of service to the community. J Millward updated the Council on insurance and depreciation adding 3% on rates. Management have spread the depreciation over nine years of the LTP and he explained the rational in a high inflationary environment. The Annual Report would be released in October and will show a 15% movement. It was advised that Councils nationwide are under a lot of pressure with mid-range of 15% for rate increases. Staff worked hard to keep to minimal increases from rates that went to the community consultation in March. The Mayor had discussed with the Management and was assured that every lever has been pulled to get to the average rate, without compromising the level of service to the community. Land sales is an option and staff will be encouraged to continue to work within the situation to assist with year two of the LTP.

Mayor Gordon commented that all Council's were affected by substantial increases in the current insurance market, which attributed to very sobering considerations.

4.2 Roading Staff Submission May 2024 – Request Changes to the Roading Capital Works Budget
 – G Cleary (General Manager Utilities and Roading) and J McBride (Roading and Transportation Manager)

J McBride commented there were currently no allowance for maintenance. The Williams Street bridge upgrade was allocated in years four and five. Waka Kotahi were reviewing emergency funding repairs due to rainfall, with no allowance proposed and the National list of funding would not be known until September 2024, which caused uncertainty until then.

Mayor Gordon commented on maintenance and leaf fall. G Cleary suggested consideration of two other roading reports before a decision of this report.

Councillor Blackie enquired about the gravel pit and what implications were if the project was pushed out. J McBride advised there was a need to purchase land for a continuing gravel source. Weather events have been utilising the current gravel pits.

At this point the meeting moved to consider items 4.3 and 4.4 before returning to consider this report. The order has remained that of the agenda order.

- (d) Notes that carry over projects from 2023/24 have been included in the updated budgets.
- (e) **Notes** that the outcome of the National Land Transport Programme application is unlikely to be known until September 2024, and there is a risk some projects within the Long Term Plan will not receive cofunding. Should this occur then a report will be brought to Council on this matter.
- (f) **Notes** that overall there is no impact on the Roading rates due to the proposed changes, as these are primarily moving budget between years and therefore these small changes can be smoothed to achieve a zero increase overall.
- (g) **Notes** that there is currently no allowance made within Council budgets for responding to emergency events.
- (h) **Notes** that there is currently no allowance in the next three years for maintenance of the Williams Street Bridge Balustrade, and that funding for the replacement of the balustrade currently sits in 2027/28.
- (i) **Circulates** this **report** to the Community Boards for information.

#### **CARRIED**

Mayor Gordon commented on the importance to residents for regular maintenance on leaf fall in Queen Street and the situation was currently being reviewed. It was a busy area and the community have strong views. He was supportive of the motion.

Councillor Brine acknowledged the Queen Street tree situation with leaf fall but noted that other streets in the district suffer similar afflictions.

Councillor Redmond stated he would support the motion. He reflected on the Lees Valley resilience works which are proactive as the road is critical for residents and the unique area contributes to the district economy, therefore was supportive of this project. The gravel pit was needed as there is ongoing need for gravel so this project needs to proceed. With regard to the Townsend Road culvert, Councillor Redmond commented on this being another link into Rangiora and with increasing traffic on that route it was essential the road be widened.

Councillor Fulton endorsed comments regarding Lees Valley and thanked staff for their diligence in an area with a challenging environment and the resilience of the residents with rainfall and road conditions. The current gravel pits are reducing in life expectancy and the Council need to plan for the future, therefore he was supportive of the motion.

Councillor Mealings believed this was a pragmatic reshuffle of resources. She commented it was a bit disappointing that the Tram Road safety improvements were pushed out a year, but was accepting of the situation if it is only one year. Councillor Mealings commented on the need for gravel sourced locally and the Lees Valley project must be done. She was appreciative of staff juggling complex roading projects.

Mayor Gordon, in his right of reply, commented on the Townsend Road culvert and school safety with work included in the budget. Lees Valley is important to be maintained and during a recent visit to the area it was clear that users and residents showed great community spirit. Mayor Gordon acknowledged work put in however there was much more to be done in this area. He noted that there were more challenges ahead as roading contracts were coming up and meeting expectations of the community would need to be carefully balanced.

# 4.3 Roading Staff Submission May 2024 - Rangiora Eastern Link Road Summary of Submissions - G Cleary (General Manager Utilities and Roading) and J McBride (Roading and Transportation Manager)

J McBride noted there were 170 submissions received with 100 people supportive of the Council option; 35 people did not support; 21 wanting the timing moved out, and six submissions not support the other options. The majority of submitters were in favour of including the Eastern Bypass link in the LTP.

Mayor Gordon commented on a discussion last week with Waka Kotahi and that for the project to be considered it has to be included in the LTP. J McBride confirmed that was the case for the project to be put forward for Waka Kotahi consideration. There was a similar situation with Skew Bridge.

Councillor Ward sought clarification that by putting the Eastern Bypass into the LTP there is no impact on rates in this year. J McBride commented that first there is some work required for the business case and then 90% of funding is required in 2028-30. There would be some funding in this coming financial year for funding preparation.

In a supplementary question Councillor Ward sought clarification that if the project was not in the LTP then the Development Contributions were at risk. Staff confirmed this was the situation. Councillor Ward then commented that if the project is delayed it will cost more with inflation and because of capex projects are behind (34% completed in next year) enquired if planning staff will have the time to put into both the Eastern Bypass and Skew Bridge projects. G Cleary advised there are timing considerations of the projects due to the deliverability with consents, property purchase, design, etc and lot of work up front however the big costs do come in the later years.

Councillor Fulton enquired if performance on the Rangiora link improved the Tuahiwi-Rangiora road connections being all linked. J McBride reflected that whilst the projects are helpful occurring together it does not need to happen together however they interrelate on the overall roading network. In a supplementary question

In a supplementary question Councillor Fulton enquired if problems are created because of the timing. G Cleary advised this was not the case but other projects do need to be conscious of each component and they can be done as individual projects.

Councillor Redmond sought clarification if no Waka Kotahi funding was forthcoming and the Council support the option today, where did that leave the project. J McBride advised the project would be paused and a report would be brought back to the Council. The current recommendation allows staff to get started. It was a significant decision for the Council and further consultation with the Council for future direction would occur. Councillor Redmond clarified that the Council was not committing to the project if no funding was forthcoming from Waka Kotahi. Staff confirmed that was the situation.

Councillor Redmond asked staff if there was a choice to prioritise Skew Bridge or the Eastern Bypass which would they recommend. Staff advised that both projects had significant impacts on the roading network however the Eastern Bypass would be the higher priority between the two.

Councillor Blackie sought clarification on the business case, enquiring if Lineside Road and other pinch points into Kaiapoi has impacts with Waka Kotahi. Staff did not believe it needs to be contingent on Waka Kotahi funding as the next three years would involve design and consenting. While it was better if the two projects are linked and coordinated it is not essential.

Councillor Goldsworthy enquired how the Eastern Bypass impacts on rating impacts and the benefits to the eastern links. Staff commented on the Woodend bypass helping with north/northwest traffic, with the Eastern link also feeding in. The Woodend bypass only has links to Pineacres and Pegasus. The Council always has options on how it rates however the Council has taken a district wide network perspective. The Easten link road as example involves 25% development contributions, 25% from district wide contribution and 50% from ratepayers (aside from Waka Kotahi funding).

In a supplementary question Councillor Goldsworthy enquired if the Council took it a step further how would it impact on all other rating services such as 3waters. G Cleary advised he did not believe this was significant enough a project to change the rating model. J Millward commented that it was something to consider with the next rating review, however there are other complications such as roading damage and subsidies for different types of vehicles.

#### THAT the Council:

- (a) **Receives** Report No. 240514076789.
- (b) **Approves** the inclusion of the Rangiora Eastern Link Road in the Long Term Plan as consulted upon.
- (c) **Notes** that the majority of consultation feedback was in favour of progressing the construction of the Rangiora Eastern Link Road (65.4%).
- (d) **Notes** staff have submitted this project as part of the application to National Land Transport Plan application to NZ Transport Agency (Waka Kotahi).
- (e) **Notes** that the outcome of the application to the National Land Transport Plan 2024-2027 is unlikely to be known until September 2024.
- (f) **Notes** that the outcome of the National Land Transport Plan 2024–2027 is known, staff will a report to council to confirm direction forward.
- (g) **Notes** that prior to funding being confirmed staff will be progressing enabling discussions with NZ Transport Agency, KiwiRail, and Environment Canterbury, as well as preparing information to support a future business case.
- (h) **Notes** that the proposed funding split between Levels of Service and Growth for this project will be confirmed during the development of the Detailed Business Case and until such time the level of co-funding available will remain uncertain.

## **CARRIED**

Councillor Ward stated she was supportive of the motion as this was the first step of getting the project accepted into the LTP. Councillor Ward believed any delay would be financially detrimental and inflation would take over with increased costs. The Western side of Rangiora needed a link road as well as the Skew Bridge upgrade to cater for the growing district. Councillor Ward believed that if the project was delayed it would cause a negative knock-on effect for sustainability and businesses to operate, along with increasing gridlock in Southbrook. Councillor Ward firmly stated that planning must start now to meet obligations to ratepayers.

Mayor Gordon acknowledged Councillor Ward as a passionate advocate of the project. He was supportive of including the project in the LTP to aid funding and build case with Waka Kotahi. Mayor Gordon spoke of not supportive of the project being funded 100% by rates and he would not let the government off the hook for a fair contribution, therefore he would continue to advocate for funding. The public expect the Council to cater for growth. Mayor Gordon emphasised to the Council that this was not just one project, and that Skew Bridge also requires funding to aid the coordinated plan of the overall network. Mayor Gordon stated he would continue to ask for Southbrook improvements and encourage vehicles to use alternative routines. He was able to advise that Lineside Road would no longer have funding for a central wire rope barrier the length of the road, and therefore there were other opportunities to discuss an opportunity to reallocate funding to make the area safe and improved. Mayor Gordon stated that development contributions cannot be compromised and that the detailed design would pick up residents' concerns as the Council continue to build a business case to improving the roading network over the next 10 years.

Councillor Brine stated he would support the motion, as he reflected on the concept/idea of a Eastern bypass some 20years ago, due to the indications of how busy Rangiora and the surrounding area would get in the future. He reflected on the history of community and council decisions of the time, stated today's decision was a long time coming.

Councillor Redmond was supportive of the motion however held some reservations with Waka Kotahi funding commitment balanced against the need to have a vision for the future. Councillor Redmond noted the staff priority, the network overall, connectivity and the future. He acknowledged the bypass was essential for the future however in the absence of any Waka Kotahi funding the Council would need to review the situation.

Councillor Fulton had given consideration to the project noting it is one of four or five transport plans for improved connectivity with Kaiapoi, Woodend and Pegasus. He noted the situation may need to be revisited if the government are not funding going forward however, he would support the motion for now.

Councillor Goldsworthy commented that he was conflicted with the 'nice to have' verse necessity given the economic situation and the ambiguity of Waka Kotahi funding contribution however he would support the motion for inclusion in the LTP.

Councillor Blackie was supportive of advocating to Waka Kotahi for funding. He commented on the strategy to get people out of cars and yet research shows if you build a road it will be filled with cars. Councillor Blackie hoped the business case included updating the three roads we have rather than building a fourth road.

Councillor Ward, in her in right of reply, commented that short of buying a lot of property, which is not practical to widen current roads, the proposal was, in her opinion, the most practical option and would make movement in and out of the township much more sustainable.

4.4 Roading Staff Submission May 2024 – Proposed Adjustments to Walking and Cycling Budgets
 – G Cleary (General Manager Utilities and Roading) and J McBride (Roading and Transportation Manager)

J McBride, on introducing the report noted a date was incorrect in the report. The Transport Choices programme, which was reduced in funding and the draft National Policy Statement indicated significantly less funding in this area however staff recommend continuation with the project subject to Waka Kotahi funding. Up until now Pegasus was not included in funding programmes.

Staff noted that the new footpath programme was previously unsubsidised and now this was recommended to continue unsubsidised however it requires \$100,000 in the next financial year, with footpaths for East Belt placed in the 2024/25 year.

Mayor Gordon commented on recommendation (d) which will consider more when there is more clarity surrounding the Better Off Funding outcomes.

- (b) **Approves** the following budget changes:
  - i. Carry over New Footpaths Major Towns (PJ100746) budget of \$144,800.00 from 2023/24 into the 2024/25 financial year.
  - ii. Bring forward New Footpaths Major Towns (PJ100746) budget of \$100,000 from 2025/26 into the 2024/25 financial year, to allow both Lees Rd and East Belt paths to proceed.
  - iii. Carry over Delivering Strategic Cycleways (PJ 102153) budget of \$931,059.45 from 2023/24 into 2024/25 financial year.

- (c) **Notes** the carryover of the Kaiapoi to Woodend Better Off Funding (PJ 102138) budget of \$851,982 from 2023/24 into 2024/25 financial year is included within the Finance Carry Over Report.
- (d) **Notes** that the Woodend to Ravenswood Cycleway (Chinnery's Road to the Ravenswood Reserve) cycling connection will not proceed until such time as the outcome of the National Land Transport Programme (NLTP) Funding Application is known.
- (e) Notes that a funding application has not been put in for the Kaiapoi to Woodend connection as part of the NLTP bid at this time, due to the Woodend Bypass construction being planned and Council's strong desire to see a walking & cycling connection delivered as part of that project.
- (f) **Notes** that historically Council has funded the construction of new footpaths as unsubsidised works, as this is generally an area that does not receive co-funding.
- (g) Notes that staff are continuing to develop the detailed design, and tender documentation of the Lees Road Footpath, East Belt Footpath and Woodend to Ravenswood Cycleway from within existing approved subsidised budgets.
- (h) Notes that the Chinnery's Road to Ravenswood section above was a portion of the wider Woodend to Ravenswood Cycleway which was formerly part of the "Delivering Strategic Cycleways" category of the Transport Choices Programme, and both Lees Road, and East Belt footpaths were within the "Creating Walkable Neighbourhoods" category of the Transport Choices programme.
- (i) **Notes** that an application for co-funding has been submitted through the National Land Transport Programme (NLTP) for the Woodend to Ravenswood walking & cycling connection, however the outcome of this is unlikely to be known until September 2024.
- (j) **Notes** that a further report will be brought back to Council once the result of the National Land Transport Programme (NLTP) applications is known.
- (k) Notes that a separate report to Council on options for progressing the Kaiapoi to Woodend walking & cycling connection utilising the Better-Off funding that was previously identified for this project.
- (I) **Notes** that if construction was to proceed then this would be within the 2024/25 financial year.
- (m) Circulates this report to all Boards for their information.

Councillor Ward remarked that what was set out in the report was important for the community and appreciated the work that staff had undertaken to this point.

Councillor Cairns commented on the connection for local residents within Woodend and how this being funded will make people happy therefore he was supportive of the motion.

Mayor Gordon was supportive of the motion and acknowledged the amount of work that goes into such projects. He reflected on recent discussions with the Department of Internal Affairs regarding the Better-Off Funding programme, however the Minister wants other priorities such as 3Waters, and therefore clarity is still being sought on what government funding would be forthcoming. Mayor Gordon reflected on the importance of the Ravenswood / Woodend link and howe the Woodend Path was a huge benefit to the wider community. He would continue to advocate for safe crossing points at Ravenswood and Pegasus.

Councillor Redmond stated he would support the motion however it was essential for co-funding projects such as the Woodend-Pegasus footpath as connectively was hugely important. Councillor Redmond stated that if the Transport Choices funding was withdrawn he would not support the project if it was solely funded by the Council for cycling and clarified it would support co-funded projects.

4.5 <u>Solid Waste – Utilities and Roading Department Staff Submission to the Draft 2024-34 Long Term Plan</u> – G Cleary (General Manager Utilities and Roading) and K Waghorn (Solid Waste Asset Manager)

K Waghorn took the report as read.

Mayor Gordon enquired how was the Waste Minimisation Fund currently used. K Waghorn explained the \$50,000 budget, noting that education came from a different budget allocation.

- (b) **Approves** deferred budget as part of the deliberations on the Long Term Plan, of \$837,600 from 2024/25 to 2025/26 financial year under the Stormwater LOS (PJ 101299.000.5123) budget, for the construction of stage 1 of the Mandeville Resurgence Channel Upgrade Project. This provides a total budget of \$1,675,200 in the 2025/26 financial year.
- (c) **Notes** that the construction of stage 1 will not commence until the Council has approved the final design in following consultation with residents.
- (d) **Notes** that a total budget of \$20,940,000 added to the draft budgets for stage 2 in the later part of the 2024/34 LTP and spread over 6 years remains unchanged as part of this staff submission.

Mayor Gordon supported the budget but stated that more work is to be done in the Manderville community and a process and plan to link back with the community through clear communication would be occurring in the near future. There was more community input to occur before any construction would happen. Mayor Gordon acknowledged that had Councillor Williams been present, he would be supportive of this report. Mayor Gordon stated that the Council needed to ensure our plan matches community expectations.

Councillor Brine remarked that this is an investment and considerable consultation would be undertaken however he was also aware that the Council will try to please most people, most of the time, but unlikely to satisfy all.

Councillor Fulton commented that this is a good start and enables the Council to move forward with the community. The Council acknowledged the emotion of the residents of Mandeville, noting that Stage 2 is for another day. He was supportive of this positive first step and looked forward to the plan progressing.

Councillor Mealings stated that while it may be frustrating for some to defer the project for a year, it is imperative that the Council sit down with the community and really understand what we dealing with, particularly regarding modelling and understanding the consequences and consenting etc as this is not simple to achieve a satisfactory, long term plan for the community. Councillor Mealings commented that this plan provides a pathway forward.

J Recker took the report as read.

Councillor Goldsworthy enquired if some of these projects would fall under the resilience project. Staff did not believe they are under the same umbrella.

Councillor Brine reflected on the number of submissions, asking if the Council were to approve the report, how does this impact on the resilience project. Mayor Gordon advised that aspect was referred to in another report for consideration during the meeting and to hold the questions until then.

4.9 <u>Funding Flood Resilience and Improvements</u> – G Cleary (General Manager Utilities and Roading) and K Simpson (3 Waters Manager)

G Cleary took the report as read.

Councillor Brine enquired if this report should be considered ahead of the submission comments. G Cleary advised that the Council had already heard from submitters, read the submissions and taken into account matters and therefore the decisions on this report would shape the responses to submitters.

Councillor Mealings enquired if matters will be applied to asset damage since Waka Kotahi do not fund for emergency weather events. G Cleary stated the team will be focused on drainage but it does cross over to the roading network. Funding could be applied in that area and the Council has discretion which projects the funding is put to work.

Councillor Fulton asked if the Council employ persons, will they sit in one area or in a dry winter do they get redeployed. G Cleary advised that the personnel would sit as a distinct team as currently resourcing is dragged from across the teams however this has impacts on the various teams. During non-flooding times there will be other work for this team to focus on. With appropriate resourcing staff can front-foot some work rather than wait for a flood or major event. This team will leverage off exiting PDU and systems in place for delivering projects, with benefits of having a focused team.

Following a supplementary question from Councillor Fulton about the team being deployed for the Mandeville situation, staff confirmed that could occur.

Moved: Councillor Brine Seconded: Councillor Goldsworthy

## **THAT** the Council:

- (a) **Receives** Report No. 240514076874;
- (b) **Approves** Option A (a permanent Infrastructure Resilience Team), as consulted within the Long Term Plan 2024-34, with an annual cost of \$480,000 to be funded 50% from operational budgets and 50% from capital works budgets;
- (c) **Notes** that the rating impact of the funding 50% of the Infrastructure Resilience Team from operational budgets on a District wide basis would increase rates by approximately \$13.33 (including GST) per ratepayer;
- (d) **Approves**, as consulted, the Flood Recovery and Resilience capital works budget of \$20 million spread over 10 years of the Long Term Plan 2024-34;
- (e) **Notes** that the rating impact of loan funding the \$20 million for Flood Recovery and Resilience budget on a District wide basis over a 25 year period would increase rates by a total of approximately \$28.91 (including GST) per ratepayer on average of the next 10 years.

**CARRIED** 

Councillor Brine commented on how good ideas are created and go through a process but often it is ineffective resources and funding that then has flow on effects to the desired outcome. This is staff driven advising of the benefits and the Council being prepared to resource it to make essential steps forward.

Councillor Goldsworthy stated that if you vote for this motion, then be proud of a proactive step of being resilience in our community and protecting our infrastructure that our community has paid for. This could save money in the longer term, and he could see the benefits of having a dedicated team, therefore was supportive of the motion.

Councillor Mealings stated this is an important project. She reminded colleagues of the \$10m unbudgeted funds for emergency funding that were required previously and Waka Kotaki funding being harder to receive, however this initiative will aid the overall goals. Councillor Mealings commented on the volume of service requests from previous flood events and how this team will assist the workflows and impacts on the community which benefit directly.

Mayor Gordon was supportive of this motion and acknowledged the proactive way the team has come up the proposal. He spoke of previous involvement with a number of Civil Defence events and the importance of having a team to respond quickly therefore was 100% in support of the motion. He would prefer having the resource on board rather than hiring expensive consultants. Mayor Gordon reflected on conversations with residents affected by the past flood events and the costs involved to protect property. Mayor Gordon stated that if this doesn't happen the Council is leaving the community vulnerable, therefore urged the members to support the motion.

Councillor Redmond stated he would support the motion, noting that submissions received were generally balanced on pro or against. This report supports the community and the ongoing discussions with the community.

Councillor Cairns agreed with colleagues' comments and acknowledged local knowledge and localism, with the need to protect our community and property, therefore he fully supported the motion.

4.10 <u>Wastewater – Utilities and Roading Department Staff Submission to the Draft 2025/34 Long</u>
<u>Term Plan</u> – G Cleary (General Manager Utilities and Roading), K Simpson (3 Waters Manager) and C Fahey (Water and Wastewater Asset Manager)

The report was taken as read. There were no questions.

Moved: Mayor Gordon Seconded: Councillor Fulton

THAT the Council:

- (a) Receives Report No. 240405053554.
- (b) **Approves** adding a new budget of \$540,000, comprising of \$513,000 renewals and \$27,000 growth, for the Raven Quay Gravity Main Renewal project in 24/25.
- (c) **Notes** that this project will be funded 95% by renewals and 5% through growth as the pipe will be sized to receive additional flow from growth in the area.
- (d) **Notes** that there will be an increase of \$4.03 in the Kaiapoi Sewer Development Contributions because of this new budget being added due to the growth portion of the budget.
- (e) **Notes** that there will be no rating impact from the renewals portion of the budget as there is sufficient balance in the EDSS renewals fund to fund the project.
- (f) **Notes** that design of the gravity main is already in progress and the construction contract will be tendered in the first quarter of the 2024/25 financial year.
- (g) **Approves** transferring \$100,000 from the Oxford WWTP Upgrade from 2024/25 to 2025/26 as this budget is not required based on change in the scope for 2024/25.
- (h) **Notes** that this budget change will reduce the Oxford Sewer Rate by \$7.63 or 0.73% as it is solely debt funded.
- (i) **Approves** removing the Woodend WWTP Overflow Improvement budgets of \$52,350 from 24/25 as the budget is no longer required.
- (j) **Notes** that there will be a minor decrease to the EDSS rate as a result of removing the Woodend WWTP Overflow Improvement budget as it is solely debt funded.
- (k) **Circulates** this report to the Community Boards for their information.

The Council adjourned for refreshments at 11am and recommenced at 11.20am.

## 4.11 Response to Submissions for Building the Right Facilities at the Right Time (Southbrook Grant and Cricket Oval Grant) – G MacLeod (Community Greenspace Manager)

G MacLeod introduced the report noting that the Southbrook Sports Club (SSC) proposal for support of \$1.3 million towards facilities at Southbrook Park had been put into year four of the LTP following public submissions as it was considered it was the right time financially. From a Club perspective it would also allow time for them to raise the \$2.6 million for their contribution

Councillor Goldsworthy asked, with regard to the SSC funding, did that give the Council any control or ownership over the building? G MacLeod noted that the Council changing rooms were under their building. The ownership of the building would be covered with the new build.

Councillor Ward asked if the option for the Council to just upgrade the changing sheds/showers and leave the Club to fund the rest of the build had been considered. G MacLeod noted that the Club needed to show that they could raise their \$2.6 million contribution and had a lot of work to do as a Club. It was still necessary to provide changing rooms as they were currently not meeting the needs of junior or women's sport.

C Brown noted that it would be more expensive in the long run if the changing rooms were upgraded now. He believed pushing out the build by four years would give the Club time to achieve something cost effective.

Councillor Ward asked what assistance the Council could give to the club raising funds. C Brown noted that if the Club Board supported the recommendation and approved the Council's \$1.3 million provisional contribution to the facility, then that would be a signal to Rata or Lotteries that the Council was a partner to the project and usually that would be enough indication of support to assist applications. Lotteries may require further confirmation such as an issued a Building Consent.

Councillor Redmond asked about Council policy in terms of toilets and changing rooms as opposed to clubrooms. G MacLeod advised that generally clubrooms were club funded, however there was a level of service required for toilets and changing rooms as a necessary provision for sport. C Brown noted that the feasibility study identified that the SSC was an important part of the community facility network.

Councillor Fulton asked if the funding provision to the club would allow the Council to have some say around the table. C Brown noted that work around potential governance models had not yet been done, the feasibility study identified that it would be important for the Council to consider its future involvement for example, full control and lease. There were several different options.

Councillor Fulton queried if there had been consideration of provision for other users. C Brown replied yes, the justification for \$1.3 million was on the basis that it would provide a key community facility for the district.

Councillor Cairns queried comparable facilities in the district. G MacLeod referred to the renewal programme for facilities and noted the Loburn Domain Pavilion was in year seven of the LTP for upgrade work.

Councillor Cairns raised Kendall Park as in a much worse condition than Southbrook, and asked why that was not on the list for renewal. G MacLeod commented on the difficulty of planning when there was change within clubs. In addition, there was also discussion with New Zealand Football around funding.

Councillor Cairns asked if the second field for Mainpower Oval was to be a first class field. G MacLeod advised that it was for representative cricket and to help accommodate the large growth in women's cricket rather than a flow-over field for first class cricket. Hagley was only able to stage a certain amount of cricket and the field would assist with the whole network of cricket.

Councillor Cairns noted that in the LTP there was \$790,000 provision for Mainpower Oval and asked if that would increase with the new field. He asked if supporting bodies were not providing enough funding, and as such the Council was acting as a fallback. C Brown replied that in terms of cricket he would not agree, other first class cricket grounds were fully funded through Local Authorities while Canterbury Country Cricket (CCC) needed to fundraise another 30% for maintenance of top of what the Council provided. Football was different, it was bottom-up funded with no funding from national bodies going to grassroots, meaning pitches relied on ratepayer funding.

Councillor Blackie asked if it were time that the Council had a policy around not funding clubrooms as they were a 'nice to have'. C Brown commented that in terms of SSC while there was a clubroom component, there was also a community facility component. For those community groups that used the clubrooms it would be challenging to find other facilities. He did not believe bars should be funded, however community facilities were different.

Councillor Redmond asked what the costs were to maintain the second field and who would pay for that. C Brown did not have the exact maintenance figures, currently the Council funded 70% of maintenance and there would need to be some component to maintain the second field. The second field would make CCC more profitable.

Moved: Councillor Brine Seconded: Councillor Ward

## **THAT** the Council:

- (a) **Receives** Report No. 240507072629.
- (b) **Approves** the Council's \$1.3 million provisional contribution to the Southbrook Community Facility, currently in years two and three of the draft 2024-34 Long Term Plan be moved to year four of the 2024-34 Long Term Plan.
- (c) **Notes** that the moving of the Council's \$1.3 million provisional contribution to the Southbrook Community Facility to year four of the 2024-34 Long Term Plan is recommended as a result of the community feedback received and to allow sufficient time for the Southbrook Club fundraise.
- (d) **Notes** that the funding towards Canterbury Country Cricket for the development of a cricket oval at 154 East Belt and all other future capital replacement funding for buildings remains unchanged from the draft 2024-34 Long-Term Plan.

Councillor Cairns Against

Councillor Brine supported pushing the support to the SSC out to year four of the LTP as there was a lot that needed to be covered: As the Community Facility Portfolio holder he noted the incredibly dynamic nature of the space. Kendall Park was an example of frequent change that made it difficult to advance improvements. Kaiapoi Trustees were a good example of where a Club and the Council were able to work together for improvements. At Loburn Domain assistance had been provided to upgrade changing facilities, but not the clubroom; the Council had also helped with irrigation at the Domain. He commented that 50/50 partnerships between clubs and the Council like that proposed by CCC were worth consideration. The cricket facility at Mainpower was not a 'nice to have' as it was very well used and there had been a huge growth in women's cricket. It was very important that cricket facilities were well maintained as first-class cricket status was easily lost and hard to regain. Councillor Brine noted that a report regarding the SSC would come to the Council in due course. He asked that Councillors support the motion.

Councillor Ward agreed with pushing the SSC funding out four years as there was still a lot of work that needed to happen. The Club needed to show their fundraising ability and get things established before the Council could support. CCC had been very strong over the years and deserved support.

Mayor Gordon supported the motion and thanked Councillor Brine for his excellent summary and leadership in this space, and his time and effort for the benefit of the community. The SSC had an ambitious funding strategy which the Council had helped get the first part over the line, being the feasibility study. He agreed pushing out the funding to SSC as there was still a lot of work to complete and raising sufficient funding in the current economic climate was difficult. He understood the comments from Councillor Blackie around strategy for supporting clubs and it was something to consider, however he did like flexibility in this space and looking at proposals on their merits, for example the contribution of \$1 million to the Kaiapoi High School to enable seating that they would not have been able to have otherwise. He noted the good partnerships with Kaiapoi Trustees and Mandeville Sports Club and commented that the Sefton Hall was another challenge. He believed the support to the CCC was an easy decision as he did not want to see first class cricket lost to the district and there was a risk that it could be as highlighted by the CCC submission. The oval had originally been built with a huge amount of volunteer effort and the land had been purchased at Coldstream for that purpose.

Councillor Redmond commented that sport was very important to community wellbeing and was a core function rather than a 'nice to have'. First class cricket did provide economic benefits to the district and the proposal put forward was a good co-investment opportunity. He was less enthusiastic about the funding to the SSC and did support pushing out four years with the opportunity to be considered at the next LTP. He commented that the question from Councillor Blackie regarding toilets/change room versus clubrooms was an important one to consider.

Councillor Fulton commented on the comparison of the Mandeville Sports Centre (MSC) model to that of the SSC or CCC. The MSC was a product of its time where members of the local community had been guarantors to the project. Models like that would not happen these days and it was not possible to jump into a project and hope it worked out. The Council was providing a sound role to SSC as a space holder and enabler and the four years was sensible to allow the community to come up with the funding. The facility was important as a meeting and recreation space not just a sports centre. With regard to the CCC there were very real consequences for having a substandard first-class wicket and some facilities had never recovered from receiving a downgrade. CCC was a high performing organisation and deserved support of the Council.

Councillor Cairns commented that he had visited sports grounds when considering this report and saw a high level of inequity between grounds, in particular he noted the poor condition of changing rooms at Kendall Park. In terms of the SSC he noted that a number of users were not reflected in the income statement and asked if they were contributing to keeping the Club going. He believed that if this motion was supported there would be many sports clubs coming to Council to request more support and the Council needed to be clearer on what they would fund. On principle he would not support the motion.

Councillor Brine respected the principle that Councillor Cairns raised and did not have an issue with his argument. He had sat around the table for a number of years and over time there had been interesting challenges for community facilities. They had been able to please many people but not all the people all the time. Assistance to groups such as consenting and connections did add up. With regard to Kendall, staff were trying to progress and a report would be brought to the Council regarding an upgrade in due course. The Council did have two members appointed to the SSC and once the historical debt had been forgiven a Community Board member had been appointed. In the past Mainpower Oval had been at risk of a downgrade and the Council had immediately showed support to rectify concerns.

Councillor Brine thanked colleagues for their careful consideration of the issues and agreed with Councillor Redmond on the importance of sport to the health and wellbeing of the community.

4.12 Rangiora Civic Precinct – Service Centre and Trevor Inch Library Master Planning 2024 – C Brown (General Manager Community and Recreation), D Roxborough (Implementation Project Manager – District Regeneration) and R Hawthorne (Property Unit Manager)

C Brown advised that there had been an increase to the cost estimate for Option A – Ground Floor Library Extension from \$19.8 million in the Draft LTP to \$21.4 million. This increase was largely due to configuration changes necessary to the carpark. He noted the considerable information contained in the report and would take it as read.

Councillor Redmond asked for clarification on the level of support for the various options A B and C. C Brown noted that there was 36% support for option C, 28% support for Option A and 20% supported no spend.

C Brown advised that there had been no funding allocation for the Rangiora Museum. Staff had met with museum representatives however it was clear that they needed to go through a planning process regarding their future needs including a collection policy and storage considerations. They had several options, for example a display in the library with the display items rotating. A museum expert was going to work alongside the Rangiora Museum to look at utilising the Better Off funding and that work was nearly ready to start.

Councillor Fulton asked about the need to retrofit specialist heating or storage if museum space was not included initially and was the required later. C Brown advised that some options around museum space would need a budget increase, while others would not, for example a small display space. Better off Funding could be used to continue with designs and staff could provide updates on a museum space.

Councillor Goldsworthy raised that LTP submitters did not appear to see value in the library currently and asked was the library outdated? He asked if staff believed the community would see more value in a versatile modern library environment. C Brown advised that the current library only met levels of service in terms of square metre space based on 2014 figures. The library did an amazing job at what it did, but there were modern library options that could not offered to the community at the moment. If those options became available with an upgrade, then the community may see additional value in the facility.

Moved: Councillor Ward Seconded: Councillor Cairns

## **THAT** the Council

- (a) Receives Report No. 240322046393.
- (b) Approves Option A Ground Floor Library Extension in the Long Term Plan 2024 along with increase of capital budget for Option A to \$21,375,000 total (increased from previous allowance of \$19,805,000 in the Draft LTP) to accommodate the updated cost estimates, and retention of the draft operational budget provision of \$4,600,000, noting that overall this has a change of less than 0.04% percentage points average rates impact over and above the previous draft LTP budget provision.
- (c) **Notes** that the preferred Option A and proposed budget above also retains within the scope some urgent deferred renewals and refurbishment works to the Rangiora Service Centre, and the Trevor Inch Library structure, and that this is included within the budget as capital works over and above present routine ongoing maintenance operational budgets.

- (d) **Notes** that the preferred Option A does not include budget provision for inclusion of the Rangiora Museum at this stage, but the ability to accommodate that within the proposed budget will be established through the further steps of design refinement.
- (e) Notes that the current budget provisions only cover the first stage of what will likely be a multi-stage approach to library improvements and provision of additional staff space over the longer term. Indicative future budgets for likely expenditure beyond the term of the Long Term Plan 2024-2034 are included within the Infrastructure Strategy, however these are only approximate and depend on the final option. Full completion of all stages i.e. a two-storey service centre extension and eventual two-storey replacement of existing Trevor Inch Library structure is estimated to cost in the order of \$64m all up.
- (f) **Approves** staff continuing with preliminary design development of all options, utilising the remaining balance of Better off Funding budget, which currently sits at approximately \$150,000 currently unspent/uncommitted.

Councillor Redmond Abstained

Councillor Ward commented that the library upgrade was well overdue. The library had done an amazing job in the district but could not offer the full service that was needed in the district now. This was stage 1 in getting the library and service centre under one roof which she believed was very important to get underway.

Councillor Cairns had been a long-time supporter of libraries and believed they were important to the community and wellbeing. There was a lot of foot traffic into the library – 10,000 visitors on a monthly basis, and this would only increase with improvements. All sorts of activities were available in a modern library.

Mayor Gordon supported the motion and thanked staff for all the work that had gone into it as well as managing expectations. Providing certainty to the project was a priority. He would like to see the Museum as part of the project however there was some work to be done on that. In terms of museum storage, the overall storage could be looked at, for example extending ground floor storage at Kaiapoi which would address concerns around a lift. In terms of community support for libraries he referred to excellent customer service satisfaction surveys and libraries as a space for all members of the community to feel safe to use. The art space was a further expression of the community and staffing could be looked out of current operations. He supported the direction of the motion as a sensible plan which may be able to be brought forward if circumstances changed.

Councillor Blackie was conflicted, he understood the role of libraries but was concerned that 50% of submitters opposed library upgrades. He supported as a placeholder however with 10 years of predicted recession he could not see it happening financially.

Councillor Fulton commented that the project was needed to meet the growing needs of the population including growth and increasing diversity. He personally loved library spaces and he had observed use of space that went beyond taking out books. Libraries provided a comfortable, warm, safe, family space for the community. He believed it was important to include provision for the Rangiora Museum and space where people could share and enjoy heritage and art even if that was not immediately but was ready to go when funding allowed. He endorsed a specialised storage space. He was aware of the cost, but believed the value was immeasurable.

Councillor Redmond endorsed the comments of Councillor Blackie and noted a recent Infometrics report that showed GDP to for the district was down 0.9% which was worse than the New Zealand average. Additionally, a recent ENC business survey showed business confidence was down. His concern was around timing. He accepted the value of the library, however that needed to be balanced against the current economic climate with a recessionary outlook. Half of submitters were opposed to funding library improvements. Councillor Redmond liked the option for minor refurbishments and believed the library upgrade may need to be pushed out further than the current LTP.

Councillor Ward, in right her of reply, noted that 30-40 submitters opposed nearly everything in the LTP and that should be kept in mind when looking at the responses. The current economic climate was a great time to be going out to tender and spending money in the community before inflation increases. The upgrades were a long time overdue; they had been promised in 2014 and subsequently pushed out since then however Councillor Ward believed the community deserved better.

## 4.13 Response to Submissions for the Natural Environment Strategy Draft Long Term Plan 2024 – G MacLeod (Community Greenspace Manager)

G MacLeod took the report as read. There were no questions.

Moved: Councillor Blackie Seconded: Councillor Mealings

**THAT** the Council:

- (a) **Receives** Report No. 240514076639.
- (b) **Approves** funding to be included in the 2024- 2034 Long Term Plan for the Natural Environment Strategy (Option A) as consulted.
- (c) **Notes** that the submission responses will be put to the Natural Environment Strategy Project Control Group that would consider these within the Natural Environment Strategy and Natural Environment Strategy Implementation Plan and report back to Council.

**CARRIED** 

Councillor Blackie noted that the topic had been debated at length and noted the long-term value. It was something they had to do as mandated. There had been many hours working on this and he was happy with the contribution.

Councillor Cairns was heartened by the numbers of submissions supporting a food forest.

Councillor Mealings commented that it was an amazing piece of work completed over a year and a half that pulled together a whole body of feedback from the Natural Environment Strategy, customer satisfaction surveys and over 90 representatives from various environmental groups. She hoped colleagues would support the motion.

## 4.14 <u>Housing for the Elderly – Proposed New Housing Development</u> – R Hawthorne (Property Unit Manager)

C Brown provided a brief overview noting that the funding available was from the sale of houses, Rata Foundation funding, funding from the Better Off Funding initiative, Department of Housing & Urban Development (HUD) funding which was approved in February 2024 and debt funding of \$3.5 million.

Mayor Gordon asked about the certainty of HUD funding given the recent report on the initiative. C Brown advised that at this time funding was still available, however, if that was removed then a report would need to come back to the Council. There had been no signal that the funding would not go ahead.

Mayor Gordon suggested that the delegations to the Property Manager in the motion should be expanded to the Property Manager and the Property Portfolio holder.

Councillor Ward asked what land staff had in mind for the development. C Brown noted that there were a number of potential pieces of land including north Woodend, regeneration land in Kaiapoi, and in Rangiora. Choice of site would have an impact on the budget and a further report would come to the Council with more details. There was commercial sensitivity around development location.

Mayor Gordon noted there were two options in the staff recommendation and asked which staff supported. R Hawthorne noted Option 2 had a greater debt level however the larger number of units maximised the Rata Foundation funding. Option 2 figures were included in the Draft LTP and was the option supported by the Property Portfolio Working Group.

Mayor Gordon asked if the development would be rates neutral and staff confirmed that was the case. In fact, it was more than cost neutral and would return a surplus over time which would provide equity for future projects.

Councillor Redmond asked about the effect of Option 2 on debt levels and J Millward advised that it was within the debt ceiling.

Councillor Cairns asked if the 50/50 funding spilt was affected by which land was chosen for development. R Hawthorne advised the split was on development and land was excluded.

Councillor Goldsworthy asked what occupancy rate had been used for cost analysis and R Hawthrone advised that it was set at 97% occupancy, the properties were at below market rent and so were attractive on the open market.

- (c) **Notes** that Option 2 allows for more Units to be built, maximising additional funding from Rata Foundation, where as Option 3 results in less Units built but equally a lower debt incurred.
- (d) **Notes** that \$2 million is proposed to be spent in Year 1 of the 2024 Long Term Plan, with the balance of funds expended in Year 2 of the 2024 Long Term Plan.
- (e) **Notes** that the anticipated development is contemplated at a Council owned site or sites yet to be determined, as sanctioned in Council's Housing Policy. Some prospective sites have higher infrastructure costs while others may have higher land costs. However, the higher cost structure is already accounted for in the budget forecasts, so represent a worst case scenario.
- (f) **Notes** the proposed development options aims to be Rates neutral with a rental structure for the site that pays down the loan over time and covers all operating costs, as well as the long term renewal and replacement costs associated with the development. Options exist to mitigate financial risk through reducing (or expanding) the number of units built, and / or adjusting the debt ratio or rental revenue charged.

- (g) **Delegates** to the Property Manager and Property Portfolio holder authority to progress contract negotiations, and execution of the same, with the Department of Housing and Urban Development, to secure the \$4,651,750 funding offered through the Affordable Housing Fund administered by them.
- (h) **Delegates** to the Property Manager and Property Portfolio holder authority to progress site selection and development planning for the new complex and to bring a report to Council with further details and a recommended location in October 2024, or earlier if possible.
- (i) **Notes** that Council is contributing equity of \$2.5 million to the development, being proceeds from the sale of 7 houses previously used to operate an affordable housing scheme, which was substantially funded from a Rata Foundation Grant. They have signalled a willingness to invest further in Council's housing activity by providing a Grant for up to \$25,000 per Unit built.
- (j) **Delegates** to the Property Manager and Property Portfolio holder authority to progress discussions with the Rata Foundation to secure additional funding from them as mentioned in this report.
- (k) **Notes** that the sums mentioned in this report are GST inclusive due to GST not being claimable on residential development and that the revenue and expenditure is associated with the Housing for the Elderly Activity (164 cost centre) with \$2.5 million equity transferred from the redundant Community Housing Activity (165 cost centre).
- (I) **Notes** that the Property Portfolio Working Group have discussed the development options and are supportive of the recommendations in this report.
- (m) **Notes** the report will be provided to Community Boards for their information.

**CARRIED** 

Councillor Redmond noted he was a member of the Property Portfolio Working Group which supported Option 2, and congratulated staff on the successful HUD application. He was also concerned that the HUD funding maybe at risk, meaning the project may need to be scaled back. He encouraged his colleagues to support this project to build 32 elderly units at no cost to the ratepayer.

Councillor Ward was pleased with staff efforts to upgrade current homes and to put effort into building new units.

Councillor Mealings commented that the report was the culmination of a lot of work over an extensive time. To be able to build \$11.6 million in assets for a \$3.5 million loan, and getting 32 homes over the heads of housing vulnerable people was a great result.

Councillor Cairns noted that at a recent Kaiapoi Community Wellbeing meeting he had learnt that there were 35 people living in cars in Kaiapoi, one of those who was over 65 and had been assisted into housing. Housing was very important and he asked staff to keep up the good work in this space.

Mayor Gordon supported the motion and noted the support for the debt increase from colleagues as the overall package made sense. He was concerned about the recently released report regarding HUD funding and encouraged the project to get underway as soon as possible. He noted that the Council also had a partnership in place with Abbeyfields. The Council were aware that housing was a need and was trying to meet that need. He looked forward to an update on the HUD situation.

## Councillors Comments:

It was agreed that any reference to Significant Natural Areas (SNAs) in the response to submitters, would make it clear that it was up to private land owner/s if they wish to identify an SNA on land they owned. It was suggested the wording of the following paragraph be used:
